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Patriarchy

Patriarchy, in its cultural context refers to a social system where men hold primary power and authority in political, social and economic life, which women are largely excluded. It is characterised by male dominance, male identification, male centredness and an obsession with control. This system can manifest in various ways, including unequal power dynamics within families, limited opportunities for women in education and employment and societal norms that prioritise male perspectives and experiences.

6. Reinforced through customs, traditions, and laws.

Forms / Types of Patriarchy

1. ****Private Patriarchy**** – domination within household and family.
2. ****Public Patriarchy**** – domination in employment, politics, and institutions.
3. ****Traditional Patriarchy**** – rooted in customs, rituals, and religion.
4. ****Modern Patriarchy**** – embedded in workplace structures, laws, and media representations.

Effects of Patriarchy on Society

- Restricts women's participation in education and employment.
- Leads to gender-based violence and discrimination.
- Creates unequal power relations in family and marriage.
- Reinforces stereotypes about masculinity and femininity.
- Limits social development by excluding half of the population from equal opportunities.

Criticism of Patriarchy

- Feminist movements criticize patriarchy as the root of gender inequality.
- It undermines the principles of equality and justice.
- Modern democratic societies challenge patriarchy through laws, awareness, and empowerment programs.

Alternatives to Patriarchy
